I shall be reflecting on my time with you, but today I am thinking back to all the community outreach that has taken place at Linthwaite over the last nine and a half years. All the people who have come through our doors, not only on a Sunday, but also during the week to our different activities. The relationships with all ages that have been built up over that time, some lasting, some more fleeting, but all important.

This year the Circuit project is based around 'acts of kindness', led by the Circuit Social Justice group, and introduced at the Circuit service at Holmfirth earlier this month. Sometimes acts of kindness are random, an opportunity taken to help someone at a particular moment; sometimes these are more planned. We had a presentation on this project at our Circuit meeting last week. 'Recollections' by Ian Baxter Shopping at Hoylehouse.

Shopping at Hoylehouse? I can imagine some comments that I must be joking, unless it's convenience food or a take-away that I was looking for. This may well be true in the twenty-first century but well past the middle of the twentieth, the line of shops on Manchester Road at Hoylehouse in Linthwaite provided shopping opportunities well able to supply the everyday needs of the local population.

As a small boy I often accompanied my mother when she went shopping in the village and when I became old enough was occasionally asked to fetch something from one of the shops. This would be in the late 1940's and these reminiscences relate to that period in time.

Walking down the hill from home the first commercial premises reached were the No 7 branch of the Slaithwaite Co-operative Society, a small line of shops consisting of butchery, grocery, drapery and footwear departments. I was often sent there to pick up a loaf of bread but our meagre meat ration of those days was delivered from the Co-op butcher every Saturday morning. At the end of the shops was the Co-op house, approached by a flight of nine steps. It was here that my great-grandfather, Ned Baxter had brought up his brood of twelve children when he was the manager of the Linthwaite Co-operative Society well before it became part of the bigger Slaithwaite Society. Continuing down Chapel Hill the road was joined by Causeway Side at the bottom of which another small line of shops. The first was that of Mr Beaumont Whitely a Ladies and Gents Tailor, and next to this a general grocer with an attached fish and chip shop which we rarely patronised as my mother made her own fish and chips.

In Hoylehouse Fold was a shop at which we called often, that of Tom Pearson, Bootmaker, in those day run by his son Norman. When calling to pick up shoes that had been repaired, we passed down a corridor to the back of the shop where Norman and his repairer, Joel Rothery were to be found. They would be stitching, hammering or working on the machine, an impressive group of wheels for grinding, polishing and shining boots and shoes which was driven from an electric motor by an exposed leather belt. If new shoes were needed mother would be present and we would be ushered into the 'showroom', a dingy and dusty room at the front of the shop which was filled with boxes of shoes from which something which our mother thought suitable would eventually be found. Since then that shop has been a greengrocer, video shop, massage parlour and now attends to feet!

Going further toward Manchester Road we passed the Commercial, a public house which jutted well into the road and was distinguished by a pink granite pillar on one side of its entrance which was said to look like a column of potted meat, a commodity that was very familiar to us in those days. Walking on we passed the windows of what we knew as the mending room of George Mallinson's Spring Grove Mills where a group of ladies could be see pulling large pieces of cloth over tables and doing something to the cloth. Many years later I found out that it was not the mending room but an intermediate inspection between the finishing processes and that the room was known in the mill as 'the Cemetery'.

Having left the ladies to their work and walked under an extractor vent from which hot air with a peculiar but not unpleasant smell was blown down on the pavement we reached the junction with the A62 Manchester Road.
